Eastern Canada and the Caribbean (EC&C) District and the University of the Commonwealth Caribbean (UCC) are proud to announce a historic initiative to offer over J\$9 million in scholarships to ten outstanding students.

The scholarships were launched at a ceremony on February 21, 2025, at the UCC during Kiwanis International President Lee Kuan Yong's official visit to the District. Group Executive Chairman and Founder of UCC, Dr. Winston I. Adams OD, UCC President Professor Colin Gyles CD, and EC&C District Governor Pam Rodney-White were present to celebrate

the occasion. This esteemed assembly underscored the international collaboration and support behind the initiative.

Starting in the summer of 2025, UCC will award ten (10) scholarships per academic year to outstanding students who are or have been members of the Kiwanis Service Leadership Programme (SLP). This generous partnership between UCC & the EC&C District will provide a total of J\$912,000 JMD to each recipient over the course of two years, covering tuition for an undergraduate Associate Degree programme.

The UCC - Kiwanis EC&C District Scholarship Programme is designed to recognize and support the academic excellence and community involvement of young individuals across Canada and the Caribbean. Students admitted to UCC's undergraduate degree programmes can apply for this prestigious scholarship, which will cover the entire duration of their studies.

To be eligible, applicants must demonstrate exceptional academic performance, active participation in the Kiwanis Service Leadership Programme, and a commitment to community service. The scholarship is open to new students admitted to UCC's diverse range of undergraduate degree programmes, including business administration, information technology, education, law, and health sciences.

"This partnership is a testament to our shared commitment to education and service," said Professor Colin Gyles CD, President of UCC. "We are honored to collaborate with Kiwanis International and the EC&C District in fostering the growth and development of our youth, who are the catalysts for positive change in our societies."

EC&C District Governor Pam Rodney-White echoed this sentiment, stating, "Kiwanis has always been dedicated to serving the children of the world, and this scholarship is an

extension of that commitment. We are thrilled to see these bright students receive the support they need to pursue higher education and become leaders in their communities."

This scholarship is part of UCC's ongoing efforts to make quality tertiary education accessible to all, regardless of financial constraints. By investing in these young leaders, UCC and Kiwanis aim to create a ripple effect of positive impact across the EC&C District and beyond. The event was more than just a scholarship launch; it was a celebration of potential, achievement, and the collective support of our academic community.

"We are looking forward to welcoming these outstanding students to the UCC community," Professor Gyles added. "Their passion, dedication, and service to others align perfectly with our institutional values."



A - ENABLE ALL CHILDREN TO ACHIEVE THEIR DREAMS


- Organize awareness days and fundraisers to support local associations that work for the dreams of sick or disabled children.

- 3. Develop innovative and targeted programs to enable Kiwanians to become leaders, develop successful projects, be impactful people, and thus be recognized for their skills both at Kiwanis and in social or professional life.
- 4. Organize large-scale fundraising and awareness events (concerts, sports events, charity gala) to fund our projects for children and make our work known to a wider audience.
- 5. Foster exchanges between Kiwanis clubs and Kiwanians within the divisions, and districts, and by holding dynamic, joyful, and impactful division and district meetings where the magic of Kiwanis reigns.

C – PROMOTE KIWANIS FOR ITS IMPACT IN THE COMMUNITY

- 1. Leave our clubs to invest in our communities and conduct an active recruitment campaign to attract new members who are sensitive to the cause of children and willing to invest in our solidarity actions.
- 2. Establish partnerships with other charities, businesses or public institutions to increase our impact and visibility in the fight for children.
- 3. Reflect on the concerns of our local communities, to develop innovative and targeted programs in our respective communities to meet the specific needs and dreams of children, in different areas such as education, health, access to recreation or culture.
- 4. Host conferences throughout the district that are open to a wide audience on "Kiwanis Magic to Re-enchant the World". These events will not only be awareness raising and recruitment events, but also opportunities to raise large-scale funds and fund children's projects and dreams.
- 5. Following the election of our Club Presidents, have meetings with local, regional or national political figures to raise awareness of the impact of Kiwanis in the communities, soliciting the help of our elected officials for greater success in our actions, and explaining how Kiwanis makes children's dreams come true highlights our ability to re-enchant the world.





DOMINIQUE ROLLE - A TRAINED GRANT WRITER



Bridging gaps and strengthening communities is the surest wav positively develop any country and its people, especially when it is done through altruism and integrity. Having served in nearly

every capacity at the club level, Ms. Dominique Rolle considers Service Leadership Programs (SLP) to be the pulse and most important area of the Kiwanis organization, and she firmly believes that the purest form of helping someone is to render altruistic service to them.

As a strong advocate for youth development, Dominique, the current District Administrator (DA) for Builders Clubs in The Bahamas, sought to provide more opportunities to her SLP students in recognition of their dedication to the various Kiwanis Service Leadership Programs. Fostering good character development among the youth has been proven to increase their courage, confidence, and ability to achieve more. Therefore, she has diligently built meaningful relationships with several tertiary-level institutions and interested high schools to offer college credit courses to students. By doing so, students have the option to continue their degree or certificate programs immediately following high school. Alternatively, they can participate in job readiness programs to jump-start their professional careers.

In addition to youth development programs, DA Dominique sought to enhance the grant-funding capacity for Builders Clubs in The Bahamas. This would allow her to apply for grants both internally and externally, as well as provide clubs with helpful tips for successful grant writing as needed. Thus, she applied to participate in a National Proposal Writing Workshop in The Bahamas. With an eloquent recommendation letter from the then 2024-2025 Governor Designate, Mrs. Pam Rodney White, and an impressive application, Dominique was invited to attend the workshop. Together, she, along with twenty (20) other selected participants representing their respective Non-Governmental Organizations (NGO), was immersed in the art of grant writing. This workshop, in July 2024, the first of its kind for The Bahamas, was facilitated by the European Union in partnership with the Caribbean Policy Development Centre (CPDC), the representative body for NGOs at the Caribbean Community (CARICOM) level, and Civil Society Bahamas.

A well-written grant has a strong possibility of receiving the desired grant funding, and the more impactful the project is, the greater its chances of being funded. Therefore, the objective of the grant-writing workshop was to fulfil CPDC's commitment to building the capacity of regional NGOs, specifically in developing competitive, precise, and cogent project proposals. It was designed to further enhance participants' knowledge of the key elements of proposal writing. Additionally, this project workshop was part of a three-year

European Union-funded project titled "Enhancing CARIFORUM's Civil Society Capacity to Participate in National and Regional Development Programming and Policy Making."

Ms. Dominique Rolle has been an active member of Kiwanis International for the past fourteen (14) years through the Kiwanis Club of New Providence. She has been appointed as District Administrator (DA) for Builders Clubs in The Bahamas for the 2022-2025 term. Before becoming a District Administrator, Dominique served as a Kiwanis Advisor for Service Leadership Programs and as a Chaperone (SLP) for Key Club from 2010 to the present. In these roles, she has traveled the world with many Key Clubbers from The Bahamas District of Key Club to attend Key Club International Conventions. She currently serves as a mentor for Circle K International members and alumni.

Over the years, Dominique has received numerous awards and achievements in Kiwanis and for her work with youth in her country. these include Distinguished Kiwanis Member, Distinguished President (with Outstanding Achievement), the Ruby K Award, and the Ralph Taylor Memorial Gong Award for the best club bulletin. She is also a Certified National Youth Practitioner (with Distinction) and a skilled grant writer. DA Dominique enjoys mentoring students, all things science, and advocacy work. Her most cherished act of kindness is giving back to the community alongside her mom, Distinguished Lieutenant Governor with Excellence (2021-2022), Mrs. Irene Rolle.

HOW IT ALL STARTED

The first Key Club was formed on March 23, 1925 in Sacramento, California, with 11 charter members. Key Club was the idea of two Sacramento Kiwanis Club members, Albert C. Olney and Frank C. Vincent, who also were high school administrators. They approached their Kiwanis club with the idea of starting a junior service club in the high school. It would resemble Kiwanis, have its own classifications based on school interests and hold luncheon meetings.

The club was comprised of the key boys in the school, willing to serve the school in any way possible and to create a better school spirit. Thus, the club was dubbed Key Club. Soon, the club that had started out as a vocational guidance program expanded to become a comprehensive service organization for the entire school. It also offered a social aspect to balance its service activities.

TODAY, Key Club is the world's oldest and largest service program for high school students, having evolved into a global movement with over 225,000 members in 47 countries.

Once again, the Kiwanis Club of Manotick also donated \$3,000 each to the Ottawa Mission, The Shepherds of Good Hope and the Salvation Army to help provide warm meals during this special time of year. We also gave \$3,000 to the Ottawa Food Bank and \$1,500 to the Barrhaven Foodbank.




